A Whole New World



A daughter returning home for the holidays shares her joy about how AA has transformed her family

Picture this: It's 15 years ago and it's my first year living in Dallas. I'm on the road heading back home to Midland for Thanksgiving and the sense of dread in my stomach is potent.

As much as I want to go home and be with my family, I'm anxious and I know that somewhere, sometime during my visit the wheels are going to come off. Someone, probably my brother or dad, will get furious and a fight will ensue. Shouts and yelling will commence. I will try to say something to break it up, but I will be told to stay out of it, that it's none of my business. The anger will weigh heavily in the house as we all retreat to our separate rooms. My mom and I will walk on eggshells to avoid causing any further family drama, but at the same time will feel stifled. I won't be able to wait to get back to my life in Dallas where there's no drama, where the house is quiet, not shaking with rage, sickness, and dysfunction.

At some point during the trip, I'll take a walk by myself to escape it all, however briefly. My brother will go off and do drugs somewhere. Dad will read the paper as his form of escapism and will talk to no one. Mom will putter around the house, cleaning up from the meal and working on the mounting list of things my dad has given her to do because he's too busy. No one feels good about any of it, and we just sweep it under the rug. We put up a false front of family togetherness because we are supposed be enjoying each other's company. Then we will repeat it all a month later at Christmas, which is usually much worse.

Now, picture this: Today, my dad and brother have been sober for 14 years. Then there is me and my sobriety. I make the drive to my parents' home thinking about the fun we will have together, how grateful I am that my kids get to see a happy and healthy family and how much I look forward to being there. It's like a different world.

The kids and I arrive and my brother is at the house because he wants to see us, not because he feels coerced to be there. My dad comes home and hugs and kisses everyone and we express how glad we are to be together. We've taken the pressure off the entire family, the performance, and the expectations.

I get up early and jog to the old stadium, where I run around the bleachers for a long time and enjoy the run home. Along the way, I run into my kids and my mom walking all three dogs. So, I join up with them and we walk home together. Back at the house, my 7-year-old daughter wants me to play school with her, so I do. I am

present. I am alive. Then my 4-year-old son wants me to taste the "tea" he made for me, and I pretend to drink from the empty cup and shower him with accolades of how delicious it is. I am here. I am breathing in the now. It's a gorgeous day, and later we all go outside to play with the dogs. Then my children and I sit on the redwood swing that my dad built and rock back and forth, just enjoying the breeze and talking.

My son, Brooks, asks me to go with him to the fort that my father built 28 years ago. It still sits in the corner of the yard, sturdy and unaltered by time. We climb up into the fort and memories of my childhood—playing in the fort, jumping on the trampoline and good times with neighborhood friends—come rushing back.

Part of my childhood is sacred to me. Those were the times the neighborhood kids spent outside, all hours of the day, playing basketball, throwing the football, playing games. I never wanted to go inside.

After playing in the fort, we go inside for lunch. The kids want to call their dad, and they talk to him for an hour, telling him about swinging in the hammock, what the dogs had been doing, how the cat kept jumping up on the counter and what we will do for the rest of the week. We haven't even been here for a full day and they are happy and so am I.

I go to AA meetings with my dad and brother later in the week. My aunt will arrive on Wednesday and we will have a really nice Thanksgiving. I could never have said that 15 years ago.

I never would have thought our family could change so much. We enjoy hanging out with each other and sharing laughs. This all came from dedication to AA and a willingness to change on the part of everyone. Miracles abound and the Promises come true in this program as long as we stick around and do the work to see them. It's so worth it.
